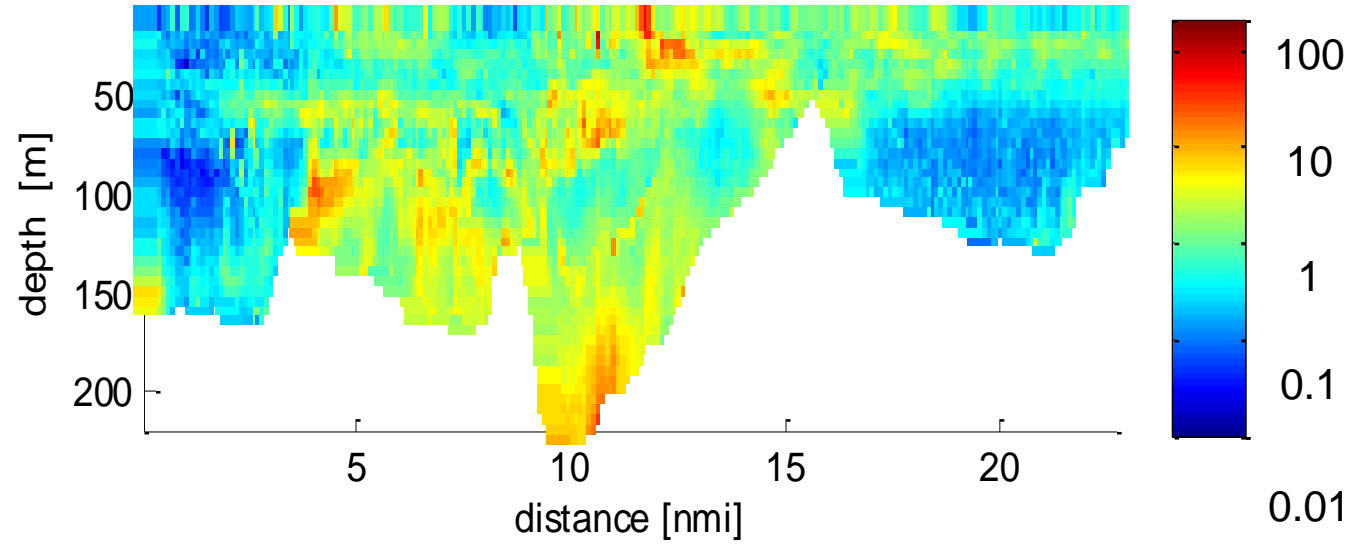
# Macroplankton biomass in water column (g ww/1000m<sup>3</sup>)



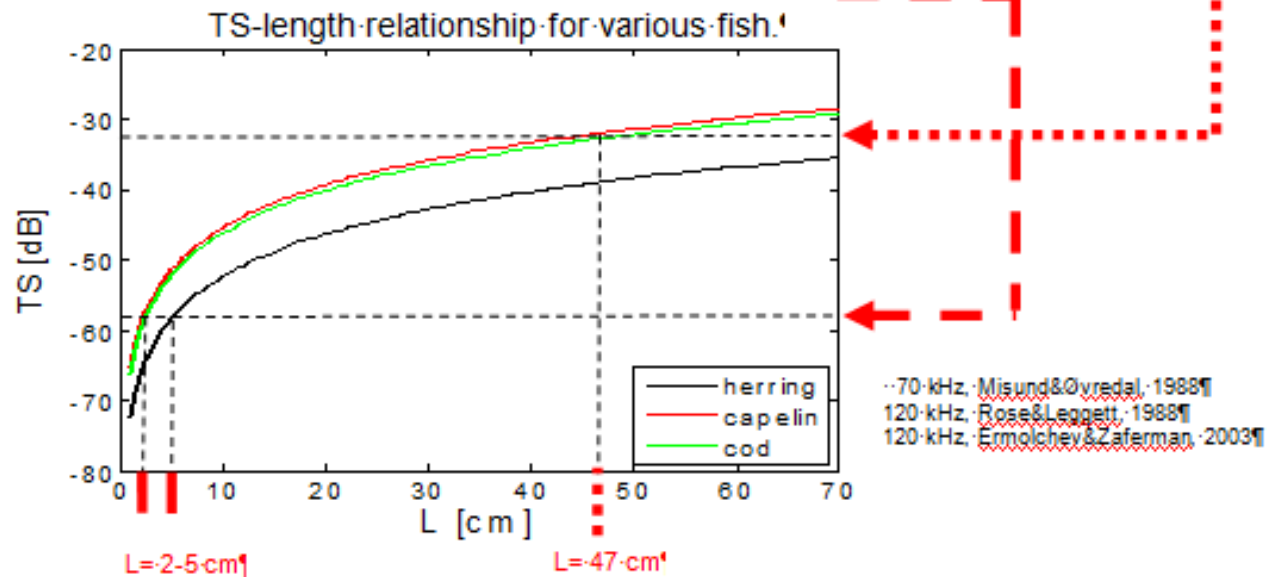
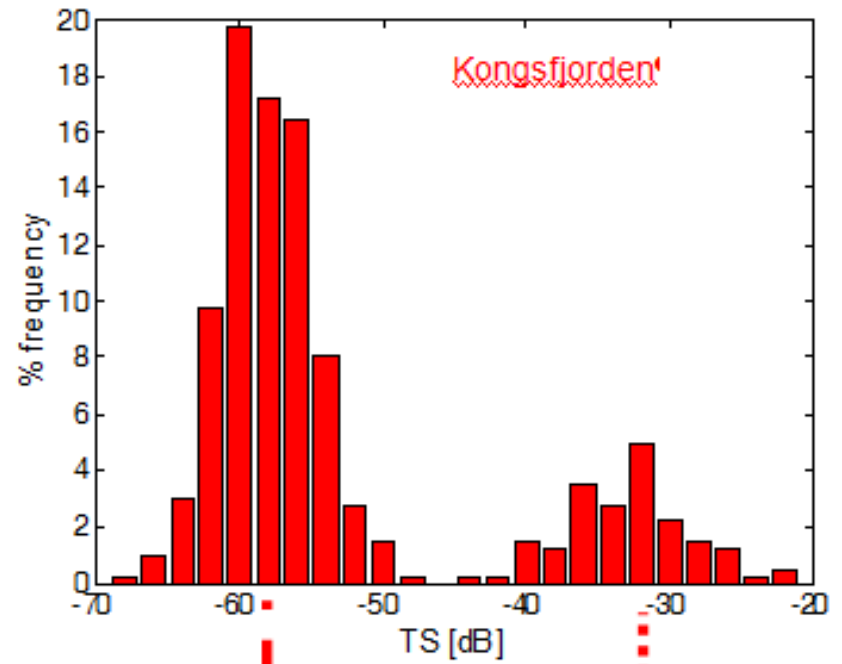
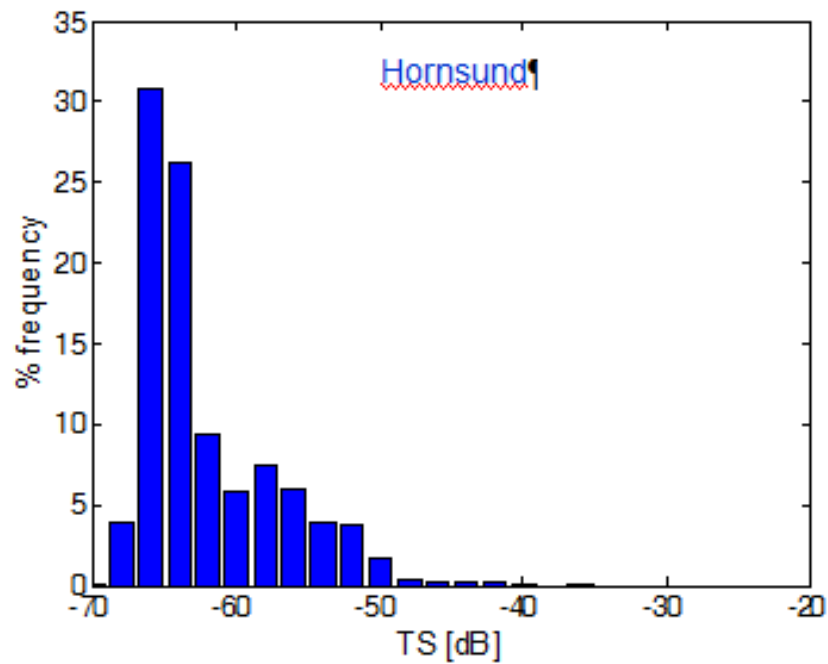

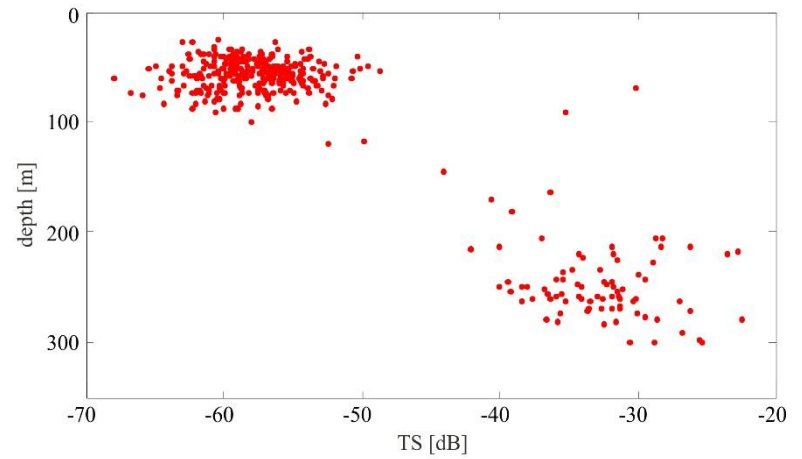
### TS-distribution-of-the-tracked-fish



Target strength and depth – small and big fish, TS = -50dB as threshold between two groups

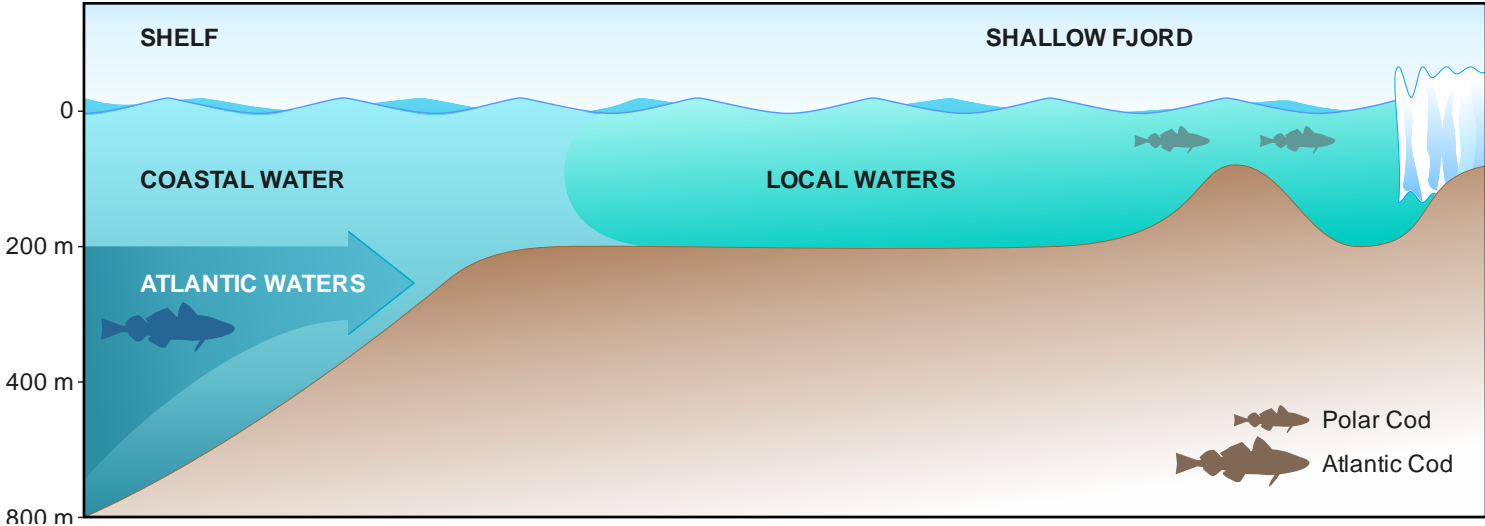
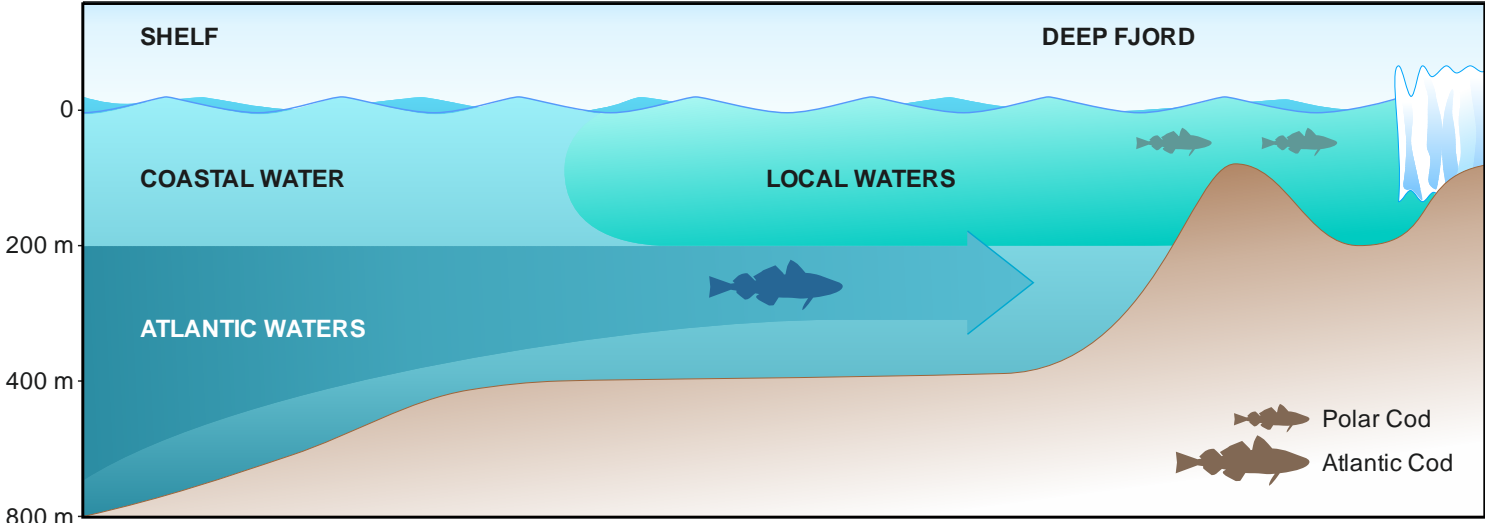

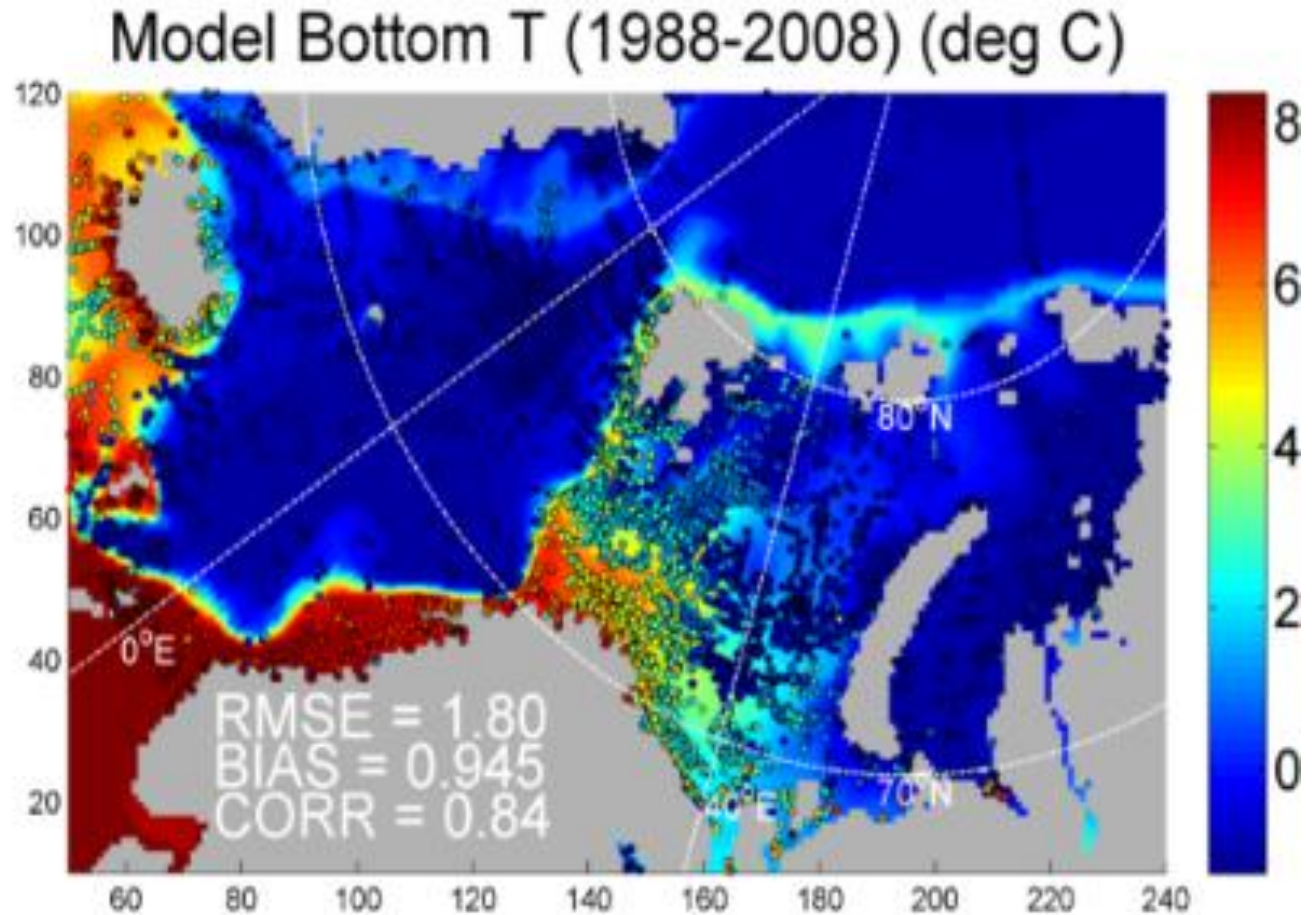
## Final remarks - relation of poikilothermic predator to temperature

Cod feeding at

Lofoten at 12°C – on fish- very active

Bjornoya at 8°C – on crabs, shrimps - active

Kongsfjorden at 4°C – on krill swarms - almost passive
